
Principal Message

The students are enjoying this experience and we aim to ensure that they remain safe in and around water. According to the National Safe Kids Campaign, drowning is the second leading cause of unintentional injury-related death to children ages one through 14. It is absolutely crucial that all kids know how to swim at a young age. There is water all around us, even if it's as small as a bathtub. Making sure that your child is comfortable in and around water is essential to their safety. Water surrounds Moulamein, we have a lake, a creek and the river and we need to work together to ensure our children are safe.

We can't encourage you enough to seek further lessons for your children now summer is upon us. The benefits of swimming are endless, and your child should learn to swim as early as possible.

Shortbread Recipe- Thanks Colleen

250g Butter

2/3 Cup castor Sugar

1 2/3 Cup plain flour

1/2 cup rice flour

1 teaspoon sugar

Preheat oven to moderately slow 160 C. Line and brush a 28cm pizza tray with butter or oil.

Beat butter and sugar in small mixing bowl, until light and creamy.

Transfer mixture to a large bowl; add sifted flours. Using a flat-bladed knife, mix to a soft dough.

Transfer to a lightly floured surface and knead until smooth.

Place dough on prepared tray and press into a 25cm round.

Prick the surface lightly with a fork and mark in segments with a knife.

Sprinkle shortbread with sugar and bake for 35m or until firm and lightly golden.

Cool on tray and then break into wedges.

(My favourite Savoury Recipe I have been making for years)

250 grams of cheddar cheese, grated

250 grams of tasty cheese, grated

Small jar of Gherkin relish

1 tub of cream cheese

Curry Powder

Paprika & Cumin

Optional: Chilli powder

Mix the three cheeses and gherkin relish together with your hand.

Break mixture up into 4-5 parts and roll together.

Roll onto a plate with curry powder, paprika cumin, chilli powder. Ensure that the cheese ball is completely covered.

Refrigerate until firm.

Serve with crackers.







Bardump....bardump....bardump!!!






