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Principal Messages

LUNCH

We have a growing number of parents delivering and dropping lunch off at school each day. Due to COVID restrictions, all parents must do this via the office. Students are not to collect their lunches at gates and fences during the day. Lunch is only to be delivered to the office. Students will be told that they cannot go the fences and gates to pick-up goods. It is also important to mention that parents can only supply food to their own children. To be honest, during this time it is preferable that students come to school with their lunch, as staff now have to manage lunch deliveries and this sometimes means that they miss their own lunch breaks, as they also need to complete playground duties. We need to uncomplicate matters during COVID.

Please be aware that lollies, chocolate, sugary foods and drinks should be minimised. Please consider packing a healthy lunch to help the students concen-



SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

Our attendance rate still needs to improve across K-6. Please make sure that you send your students to school on time each day to maximise their learning. Missing a day, impacts their achievement, academic growth and self-confidence.

Students should be at school unless:

- they have a medical certificate which states that they are unable to return to school due to an ongoing medical condition and the expected timeframe
- they are currently unwell.

In accordance with advice from NSW Health, parents and carers are reminded NOT to send children to school if they are unwell, even if they have the mildest flu-like symptoms. Schools will make arrangements for students who present as unwell or have flu-like symptoms to be sent home.

NSW Health have requested that schools encourage anyone who is unwell or has even mild flu-like symptoms, to arrange to be tested through their local medical centre.

Students and staff with flu-like symptoms will need to provide a copy of a negative COVID-19 test result before being permitted to return to school.

Schools are not required to conduct widespread temperature screening or mandate the wearing of a mask.

All schools will be vigilant when implementing infection control, physical distancing and personal hygiene protocols to protect the health and safety of students and staff. Schools will promote the need to follow good hygiene practices such as:

- regularly washing hands
- avoiding sharing drinks or food
- coughing or sneezing into your elbow, or a tissue which should be discarded immediately
- filling water bottles from bubblers rather than using the bubbler directly.

SCHOOL ACTIVITIES/SCHOOL SITE USAGE

Additional safety measures for school activities have been put in place to minimize the risk of COVID-19 transmission in schools for the remainder of Term 3.

The following principles underpin these measures:

- Where possible, students will stay within their relevant cohort group (i.e. class, year group, or stage) for all learning activities within their school in order to limit close contact to the relevant student cohort.
- Interschool activities must remain within the local community or zone. This applies to all interschool sport and physical activities, curriculum activities, arts activities and extracurricular activities organised or sponsored by the school. Schools must not travel outside of their local community area.
- Only providers that are essential to the delivery of curriculum can continue to provide services and programs until further notice.
- Parents/carers and other non-essential visitors are not allowed on the school site.
- All group singing (choirs) and/or other chanting activities, as well as the use of wind instruments in group settings, are not permitted.
- School formals, dances, graduation or other social events are not permitted at the moment.


ACTIVITIES ON HOLD FOR TERM 3

The following events will be reconsidered in Term 3. For now, these events must remain on hold.

- Kindergarten orientation
- Year 7 orientation has been delayed until Term 4
- School camps
- Excursions (other than field trips explained above)
- Interstate excursions
- International excursions (cancelled until further notice)
- School or community-run playgroups
- Face-to-face professional learning for staff. Refer to the Physical distancing guidelines.
- Parent and carer attendance at assemblies and other school events
- Parent and carer volunteers e.g. parent reading helpers (note: canteen and uniform shop volunteers are permitted)
- School-based activities that involve large gathering of adults. These include parent/ community gatherings such as parent functions, working bees, fundraisers, school BBQs, large parent information evenings, and large on-site cultural events
- Interschool sport, drama, debating and other events that are not within the local community or zone including gala days and regional sporting carnivals.


Pig the pug is an egocentric fat slob that looks like melted ice cream and is wrapped up in himself like a greedy Pig!


