Starting school is a significant event in the life of children and their families. Strong relationships and information sharing between families, early childhood settings and schools help support a child's successful transition to school. Unfortunately, due to COVID restrictions, we will need to hold off on our transition to school program. ### When to start


Children can start Kindergarten at the beginning of the school year if they turn 5, on or before 31 July that year. By law, all children must be in compulsory schooling by their 6th birthday.

When your child starts school it is an individual decision. You may wish to discuss this with your child's preschool teacher, carer, doctor or your local primary school. Our teachers are trained to work with your child regardless of their age or level of development.

Children develop at different rates and learn skills in different ways. Your school will respond to the needs, learning styles and rates of progress of individual students. Schools also plan learning experiences based on the skills students bring with them to school.

Last week, the students in Stage 1 got to participate in some exciting science-based learning as part of National Science Week, 2020. The students participated in an online zoom with others schools where they were able to listen to the story, Journey of a Sea Turtle by Mark Wilson and map the journey of the turtle using the ozbot robots. It was very exciting to be able to share our work with other schools and see their work too. Stage 1 were also excited to share that they had met Mark Wilson when he visited our school last year. We spent the afternoon writing poems and colouring pictures of Sea Turtles which we watched come to life through an app. These activities can be seen on our school Facebook page.



On Friday, we spent the morning exploring science with fun, little experiments. We created milk art using food colouring, milk and detergent and watched rainbows appear by adding warm water to a bowl of skittles. In the words of Harper, "it was the best day ever!".









### **COVID UPDATES**

Our school is doing a great job working around restrictions and COVID guidelines. Last week with the wet weather, there were a few challenges, but nothing we could not overcome. A big thank you to all staff who worked together and followed our policies so well.

In accordance with advice from NSW Health, parents and carers are reminded NOT to send children to school if they are unwell, even if they have the mildest flu-like symptoms. Schools will make arrangements for students who present as unwell or have flu-like symptoms to be sent home.

NSW Health have requested that schools encourage anyone who is unwell or has even mild flulike symptoms, to arrange to be tested through their local medical centre.

Students and staff with flu-like symptoms will need to provide a copy of a negative COVID-19 test result before being permitted to return to school.

Schools are not required to conduct widespread temperature screening or mandate the wearing of a mask.

All schools will be vigilant when implementing infection control, physical distancing and personal hygiene protocols to protect the health and safety of students and staff. Schools will promote the need to follow good hygiene practices such as:

- regularly washing hands
- avoiding sharing drinks or food
- coughing or sneezing into your elbow, or a tissue which should be discarded immediately
- filling water bottles from bubblers rather than using the bubbler directly.

Please ensure your child brings a water bottle each day.



### **LUNCH REMINDER**

We have a growing number of parents delivering and dropping lunch off to the school each day. Due to COVID restrictions, all parents must do this via the office. Students are not to collect their lunches at gates and fences during the day. Lunch is only to be delivered to the office. Students will be told that they cannot go the fences and gates to pick-up goods. It is also important to mention that parents can only supply food to their own children. To be honest, during this time it is preferable that students come to school with their lunch, as staff now have to manage lunch deliveries and this sometimes means that they miss their own lunch breaks, as they also need to complete playground duties. We need to uncomplicate matters during COVID.

Please be aware that lollies, chocolate, sugary foods and drinks should be minimised. Please consider packing a healthy lunch to help the students concentrate during the day. Kiwi Fruit and Nuts are not allowed at school.




