Congratulations to Ebony!



Attendance

Parents have a legal responsibility to send your children to school every school day. We are still having issues with attendance. Many students are sitting below the benchmark and our school is well below average for the state. The state average in a primary school is 95% and we are currently sitting at 83%. Many students have an attendance rate below this and therefore flagged by Department of Education to be under review.

Next term, the P & C would like to start a little rewards system to help improve attendance. I am hoping when the weather warms up, we will have less colds and flus around.

Students should only remain at home if there is a valid reason. Our school attendance at times is considered poor and below state averages.



All absences must be explained in a note on the child's return to school, or a phone call to the office. You may also text on our school mobile, leaving the follow details name of child, date of absence and reason for their absence on 0428 313 580. A generic text is sent home after class rolls are completed for any absences. Letters are sent home if there is no response because it is a legal requirement of the school to do so.

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:


- being sick, or having an infectious disease

- exceptional or urgent family circumstance (e.g. attending a funeral)


Term 3 Science in the Kinder and Year 1 Classroom

What do we see in the daytime sky compared to the night time sky?






What activities do we do in the daytime and what activities do we do at night time?




The sun moves across the sky in a pattern

What pattern does the sun follow in the sky each day?




How does the sun's movement across the sky change the way the landscape looks?
